The introduction of industrial clustering strategy will enhance the promotion of innovation, as well as the performance of individual companies for the reason that, innovation is of significance not only for increasing the wealth of nations in the narrow sense of increasing prosperity, but also in the more fundamental sense of enabling people to do things, which have never been done before. For this reason, it is essential to identify a set of industrial clusters, that can be used to resuscitate the Scottish economy.
